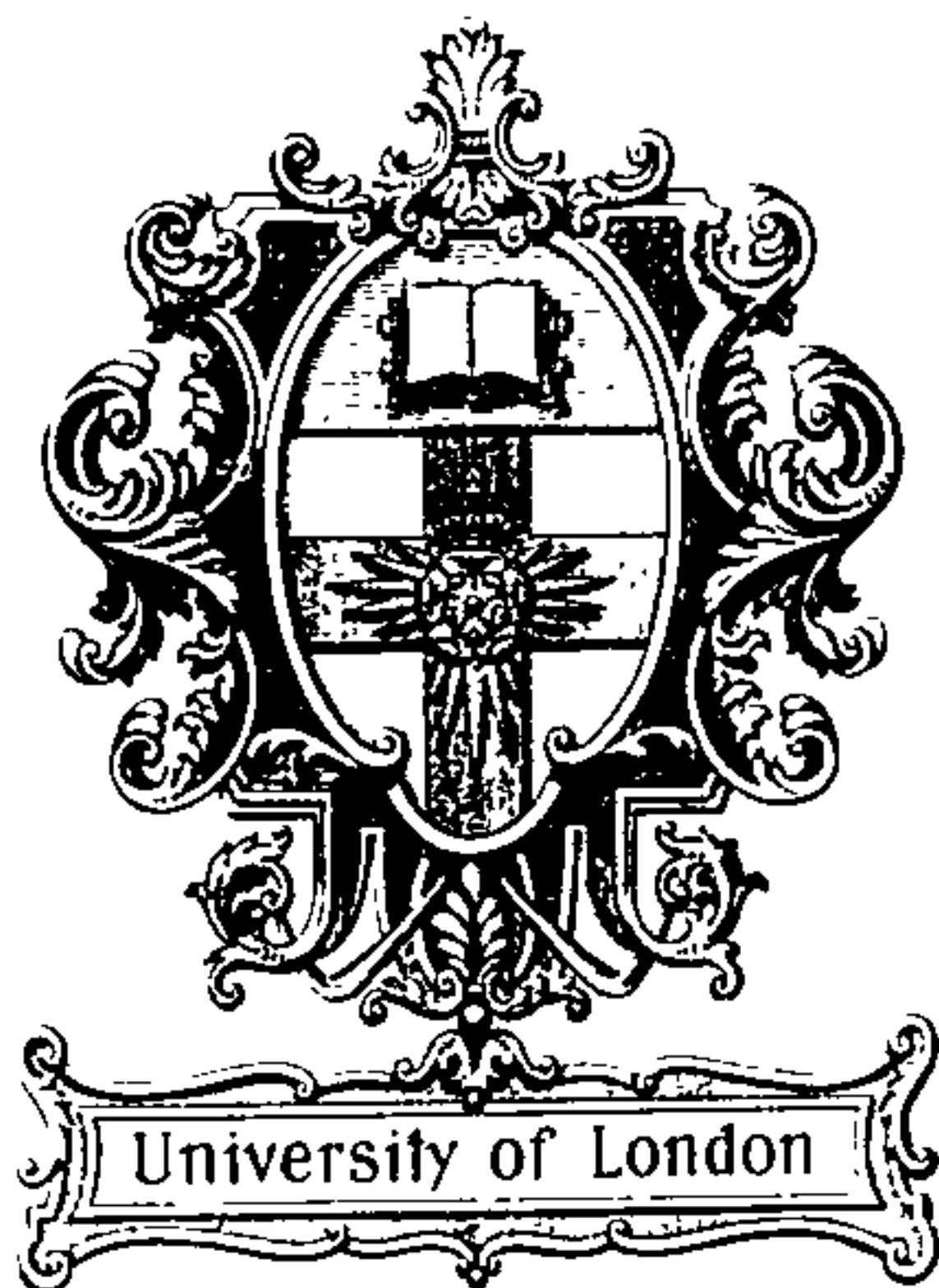

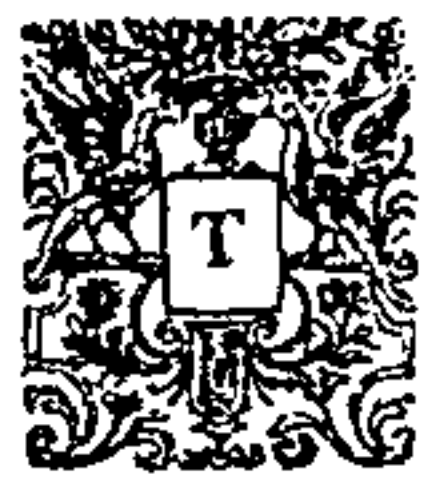

HIS Undertaking was set on foot towards the latter End of the Year 1719: And a Proposal was then published to invite all well-disposed Persons to contribute their Assistance to it. In Consequence of which, since, by the Blessing of God, and the generous Encouragement and Contributions of divers Persons of all Qualities and Conditions, it has been carried on even beyond Expectation; it may be proper to give an authentick Account of the Proceedings of the Society, as well for the Satisfaction of the Subscribers and Benefactors, as to animate others to join in the further promoting a Work so truly redounding to the Honour of Almighty God, and the Relief and Comfort of the most miserable and helpless of our Fellow-Christians.

December 2, 1719, Several Gentlemen met to consider of the most proper Methods for putting this Charitable Design in Execution; at which Meeting it was thought necessary, in the first Place, that a Subscription-Roll should be prepared: The Preamble whereof was accordingly drawn up, and agreed to, as follows:

WHEREAS great Numbers of sick Persons in this City languish for want of Necessaries, and too often dye miserably, who are not entitled to a Parochial Relief: And whereas amongst those who do receive Relief from their respective Parishes, many suffer extremely, and are sometimes lost, partly for want of Accommodations and proper Medicines in their own Houses or Lodgings, (the Closeness and Unwholesomeness of which is too often one great Cause of their Sicknes) partly by the imprudent laying out of what is so allowed, and by the Ignorance and ill Management of those about them;

WE,

*WE, whose Names are underwritten, in Obedience to the Rules of our holy Religion, desiring, so far as in us lies, to find some Remedy for this great Misery of our poor Neighbours, do subscribe the following Sums of Money to be by Us paid Yearly (during Pleasure) by Quarterly Payments, for the procuring, furnishing, and defraying the necessary Expences of an Infirmary, or Place of Entertainment, for such poor, sick Persons inhabiting in the Parish of St. Margaret's Westminster, or others, who shall be recommended by any of the Subscribers or Benefactors, with the Approbation and Consent of the major Part of the * Trustees present; who likewise are impowered to allow suitable Relief to such sick Persons, approved in the manner abovementioned, as are incapable of being removed from their respective Abodes.*

It was agreed at the foresaid Meeting, that this Preamble (as containing in short the Nature and End of the Undertaking, and the general Method they intended to proceed upon) should be forthwith Printed, and dispersed abroad.

Whereupon the Trustees soon finding themselves encouraged chearfully to go on, by the Subscriptions and Benefactions which they procured, each from his Friends and Acquaintance, and those of others, who came readily in to so apparently good and charitable a Design; and their Number being considerably increased by the Accession of new Subscribers, they proceeded to form themselves into a regular Society.

To which end they appointed one of the Subscribers to keep a particular Account of the Receipts and Payments: They agreed to meet every *Wednesday* Evening to manage and carry on the Charity; and made several Orders for the Regulation of their Proceedings at these Meetings. Dr. *Alexander Stuart*, and some time after Dr. *William Wasey* (two of the Subscribers) engaged to serve the Society (without Fee or Reward) as Physicians; and divers eminent Surgeons afforded their Assistance gratis, and lately *Claudius Amyand* and *Ambrose Dickens*, Esqrs; Serjeant Surgeons to His Majesty, were pleased to accept of being Principal Surgeons; and several Divines (Subscribers to the Charity) undertook to give daily Attendance in their Turns to the Sick Poor, who should from time to time be admitted into the *Infirmary*. To the concurring Labours of all which Gentlemen, the Society do most thankfully acknowledge the preserving the Lives, and (we hope) the saving the Souls of many of the Sick Poor (under God) to be owing.

Though it was some Time before the Society could find a House in all respects convenient for an *Infirmary*, yet they did not neglect doing what good they were able in the mean time; and many poor People were attended and relieved at their own Abodes. And even after a House was hired and furnished, and the *Infirmary* set up, they continued, and do still continue, to assist considerable Numbers of poor People upon the foot of Out-patients, the Particulars of which appear in the Abstracts hereunto annexed. These Out-patients were also assisted with a Weekly Allowance in Money, for their more comfortable Subsistence, 'till some time after the setting up the *Infirmary*; at which Time the Society, finding these Allowances too great a Burthen upon the Charity; and considering that they did not come so properly within the Compass of their main Design, came to a Resolution to stop them for the future, unless upon what they should judge a particular and extraordinary Occasion.

About the Beginning of *April 1720*, a House was taken in *Petty-France, Westminster*, and fitted up with all the necessary Accommodations for an *Infirmary*: A sober discreet Person was provided as a Matron or Housekeeper, together with a Messenger, a Nurse, &c. Here the Society have ever since held their Weekly Meet-

Meetings, at which their Incomes and Disbursements are stated and adjusted, and the particular Accounts of each regularly kept; Patients admitted and discharged; and all the Affairs of the Society transacted by as many of the Subscribers as please to meet together. The Physicians, Surgeons and Clergy giving their daily Attendance, and the Patients being carefully looked after by the Matron and Servants of the House, under the Inspection of the Society, and provided with proper Medicines, as well as with clean Lodgings, and wholesom Diet; which the Society have found by Experience to be oftentimes as effectual, towards the Recovery of these poor People, as the Medicines themselves. And here it must be remember'd, that, in order to make the Charity still more extensive, the Physicians, at such Times as they have been attending the *Infirmary*, have freely given their Advice to Numbers of poor People recommended to them, over and above those who were entertained by the Society, either in the House, or as Out-patients.

The 17th of *April* 1721, being appointed by the Society for a general Audit of their Accounts, the Account of Receipts and Disbursements for the Use of the *Infirmary* was then examined; and, upon comparing it with the Acquittances taken, and Book of Minutes, the same appeared to be just and true;

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Which Account was approved and signed by all those present.

In this Method the Society have all along proceeded; and though it was feared, that the late Shock of Public Credit might give some Check to their Progress, yet they found themselves encouraged by fresh Contributions from many pious Persons, even during the course of that Calamity: So that it is now hoped, that the whole Undertaking having been pursued thus far with such wonderful Success, settled in a Method so regular and uniform, encouraged by the Care and Liberality of so many Subscribers and Benefactors, and (above all) so visibly supported by the Blessing of God, will long continue for the promoting his Glory, and the Benefit of the Bodies and Souls of our poor Brethren, and prove one of the happy Means to draw down a Blessing upon the whole Nation; since there is scarce any one Species of Charity, which is not comprehended in it; the Hungry being fed, the Naked clothed, the Stranger taken in, the Ignorant instructed, the Sick visited and relieved, and many poor industrious People, who have nothing but the Labour of their Hands to subsist upon, preserved from perishing miserably, or becoming a Burden to their Country, and render'd useful Members of it.

Upon the whole; What remains but to renew those earnest Exhortations made in the Proposal published at the first setting on foot this Charitable Undertaking, that all good Christians will contribute their Assistance to promote it? And indeed, whatever Arguments were then made use of to persuade us to come into it, are certainly much stronger, and more convincing now. If it was then urged how pious, how truly Christian, and how universal such a Work of Charity would be: What shall we now say, when we have seen so many of the blessed Fruits of it? If it was represented how easily it might be executed, were well-disposed Persons seriously to join in it; how much stronger is this Argument to persuade us to support it, now it is actually put in Execution? If it was argued, that such a Charity as this would be a public Blessing to the whole Nation; certainly this Argument is much more seasonable now, when we daily hear of the inexpressible Miseries which

our

our Neighbours suffer from the Pestilence, and are not without Apprehensions that the same Visitation of God may be hanging over our own Heads: since, after all the great Care and Caution which our Governors have used to prevent this dreadful Calamity from coming in amongst us, every good Christian will be satisfied, that the most effectual Method to keep it away, must be our hearty Endeavours, in our several Stations, to do good; *to break off our Sins by Righteousness, and our Iniquities by shewing Mercy to the Poor.* In short, if it be any Satisfaction to a good Man, to be sure that his Charity is bestow'd upon proper Objects, and managed with the utmost Frugality and Care, and effectually answering the End he intends; if there be any Pleasure in reflecting, that we have been instrumental in the raising an Undertaking, which, if it meets with Encouragement proportionable to the Piety and Extensiveness of the Design, is likely to equal any of those Charitable Foundations, for which the City of *London* is so justly renowned: Let all these Motives (over and above those which may be urged from the Excellency, the Necessity, and the Pleasure of Charity in general) encline us to make use of this happy Opportunity of doing good, now put into our Hands, by promoting a Scheme so apparently calculated for the Glory of God, and the Benefit of the Poor; which, though still in its Infancy, has already brought forth Fruit so abundantly, and with due Encouragement may still so encrease, that thousands and thousands may receive Health and Relief from it, and bless and pray for their generous Benefactors: *That when the Ear hears us, it may bless us; and when the Eye sees us, it may give Witness to us; because we have delivered the Poor that cried, the Fatherless, and him that had none to help him: That the Blessing of him that is ready to perish may come upon us, for that we have caused the Widow's Heart to sing for Joy.* Above all, that we may be of that happy Number, to whom our Blessed Lord shall say at the general Day of Retribution: *For as much as ye have done this to the least of these my Brethren, ye have done it unto me.*
